A synopsis of the December 17, 2021 Cost Share Committee Meeting

Summary of Program Activity

- ❑ Six projects were approved for \$8.7 million.
- ❑ MoDOT's Cost Share Program has \$8.7 million available in state fiscal year 2024, \$12.9 million available in state fiscal year 2025 and \$18.0 million available in state fiscal year 2026 for cost share projects.
- ❑ MoDOT's Cost Share Program has \$0.8 million available in state fiscal year 2022, \$1.5 million available in state fiscal year 2023, \$7.0 million available in state fiscal year 2024, \$4.5 million available in state fiscal year 2025 and \$4.5 million available in state fiscal year 2026 for cost share projects that encourage economic development. The balances are pending the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission's approval of projects that encourage economic development.

MoDOT's Cost Share Program Partnerships Approved

City of Wildwood - \$1,395,000 to construct left turns lanes on Route 100 between Route 109 and Franklin County line.

City of Independence - \$3,443,438 to construct safety improvements on Route 24 between Sterling Avenue and Wilson Road.

City of Wildwood - \$1,495,000 to construct J-turns on Route 100 between Route 109 and Franklin County line.

City of Kansas City - \$1,059,392 to construct a bicycle and pedestrian bridge over Route 169.

City of Jackson - \$973,000 to construct a roundabout at Route 61 and Deerwood Drive.

City of Crestwood - \$324,500 to construct pedestrian improvements on Route 366 between Pardee Lane and Sappington Road.
